The meeting was called to order at 9:03 am. Commissioner President Russell and Commanding Officer Captain Stephen Schmeiser provided opening comments. The Commissioners presented Capt. Schmeiser with a letter thanking him for his decision to retain Gate 2 as the "Main Gate" of the Naval Air Station.

Motion carried 5-0.

(Robin Finnacom, Executive Director, Community Development Corporation) Commissioner Jarboe moved, seconded by Commissioner Dement, to approve and authorize the Commissioner President to execute the budget amendment transferring \$15,000 from project US0519, Lexington Manor South, to the BOCC Emergency Appropriation Reserve, since it has been determined that the funds are not needed in the project. Motion carried 5-0.

Motion carried 5-0.

6. Office of the Sheriff (Erin Shoemaker, Fiscal Supervisor)

Commissioner Dement moved, seconded by Commissioner Mattingly, to accept and authorize the Commissioner President to execute the LETS Training Grant Award, US1047, from the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention on behalf of the Sheriff's Office in the amount of \$4,716, and to execute the related budget amendment reducing the project budget by \$284. Motion carried 5-0.

OFFICE OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY: DECISION ON PUBLIC HEARING TO AMEND CHAPTER 267 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF ST. MARY'S COUNTY, TO ALLOW AN EXEMPTION TO THE ADMISSIONS AND AMUSEMENT TAX FOR AGRICULTURAL TOURISM ACTIVITIES

The Board held a public hearing to consider the amendment of the St. Mary's County Code to allow an exemption from the Admissions and Amusement Tax for agricultural tourism activities on March 23, 2010.

One comment was received after the public hearing which requested that the language of the Ordinance be amended to include the term "winery," rather than the term "vineyard," as drafted. This request was made in light of changes to the Zoning Ordinance definition of a winery, which were made in 2009 (defined as permitted uses in the RPD, RSC, VMS and TMX). In the RPD there is a requirement that the owner or operator of the facility cultivate grapes or other fruit on site or on other land located in the County. It was clarified that if a winery is a stand alone activity and not connected to an agriculture/farm operation and an admission fee is charged, it would be subject to the amusement tax. If the winery is part of a vineyard, i.e., an actual agricultural farm operation, and charges an admissions fee, it would be exempt from the admissions tax.

Commissioner Mattingly moved, seconded by Commissioner Dement, to amend Chapter 267-7 of Article III, Admissions and Amusement Tax, of the St. Mary's County Code to provide an exemption for agricultural tourism activities and to adopt the Ordinance as presented by staff. Motion carried 5-0.

ST. MARY'S NURSING CENTER, INC., (SMNCI) PROPOSAL OF PROPERTY TRANSFER

Present: Nursing Center Governing Board of Trustees President James O'Farrell and Kenneth W. Caps, Secretary/Treasurer Donald E. Lewis, Administrator; and William M. Holman, CFO

Commissioner Mattingly announced that he was recusing himself from the discussion and any vote on this matter due to his service as an ex-officio member of the St. Mary's Nursing Center Board of Trustees. Mr. O'Farrell presented a proposal from The St. Mary's Nursing Center's Governing Board of Trustees requesting a transfer of property and the building currently occupied by SMNCI. This real property is currently titled to the St. Mary's County Building Authority Commission and was funded through bonds issued from this Commission that will not retire until July 15, 2016. SMNCI proposes to use the real property as collateral to secure commercial financing to provide the County with the approximately \$3.5 million outstanding balance owed on the bonds. The funds paid to St. Mary's County would be placed in escrow and paid to the bond holders as they come due.

Mr. Holman described SMNCI's current situation. A decline in patient days beginning in 2004 and state budget cuts to the Medicaid program beginning in 2006 continue. Annual debt service repayment is approximately \$650,000.

Mr. Capps described the benefits of the proposal to both SMNCI and the County. For SMNCI, the proposal puts a viable asset on the Corporation books to be used as collateral, removes uncertainty with regard to ownership in 2016, and increases cash flow to fund reserves and meet future reimbursement cuts. For St. Mary's County, the proposal removes a potential liability from its books, pays \$3.5 million in advance, which may be used to retire the bonds early, and helps create an environment for SMNCI to grow and complete its strategic goals.

Commissioner Dement moved, seconded by Commissioner Raley, to direct County staff and the Building Authority Commission to work with St. Mary's Nursing Center, Inc., to complete this transaction by June 15, 2010, and to involve our bond counsel and financial advisor, as needed, with the understanding that the costs incurred will be fully reimbursed by the Nursing Center. Motion carried 4-0. Commissioner Mattingly abstained.

The Board recessed at 2:14 pm.

PUBLIC HEARINGS ON THE ST. MARY'S COUNTY RECOMMENDED FY 2011 BUDGET AND CONSTANT YIELD TAX RATE - HELD AT CHOPTICON HIGH SCHOOL, 25390 COLTON POINT RD., MORGANZA, MD

Commissioner President Russell provided welcoming remarks and commented on the budget process to date. Ms. Kramer stated that notice of the evening's public hearings was published in the Enterprise newspaper on April 16, 2010, final adoption of the FY 2011 Budget is scheduled for May 25, 2010, and any additional written comments relative to the FY 2011 Budget and the Constant Yield Tax Rate must be submitted by May 7, 2010.

Constant Yield Property Tax Rate -- Proposed Real Property Tax Increase

Ms. Kramer pesented the Board of County Commissioners' proposal to increase real property taxes. For the tax year beginning July 1, 2010, the estimated real property assessable base will increase by 4.6%, from \$10,299,298,565, to \$10,774,297,559. If St. Mary's County maintains the current tax rate of \$.857 per \$100 of assessment, real property tax revenues will increase by 4.6%, resulting in \$4,070,741 of new real property tax revenues. In order to fully offset the effect of increasing assessments, the real property tax rate should be reduced to \$.8192, the constant yield tax rate. The County is considering not reducing its real property tax rate enough to fully offset increasing assessments. The County proposes to adopt a real property tax rate of \$.857 per \$100 of assessment.

Recommended FY 2010 Budget

Ms. Kramer provided an overview of the Recommended FY 2011 Budget. The recommended general fund/operating budget for FY 2011 is \$188,614,205, which is a decrease of approximately \$10,700,000 from FY 2010 to FY 2011. Overall revenues are down \$10.1 million. The recommended budget uses \$3.5 million of the unreserved, undesignated fund balance. Property tax, income tax and energy tax rates are proposed to remain the same as the previous year.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE CONSTANT YIELD PROPERTY TAX RATE --PROPOSED REAL PROPERTY TAX INCREASE

The public hearing on the Constant Yield Tax Rate was opened for public comment at 7:20 pm. The following is a summary of each public comment presented (comments are not recorded verbatim).

Michael Hewitt, 26074 Sotterley Heights Rd., Hollywood

Maintain Constant Yield. Speaking as a small business owner, give us *something*. Three main concerns: 1. \$12-13m fund balance is our taxes. Wise to have some, but not this much. 2. No new ideas. Focus is all on increasing taxes and cutting spending; never hear anything about regional initiatives, such as jails or landfills, to take advantage of economy of scale with neighboring communities. 3. Re 7% budget reduction departments took - - non-county agencies should do the same. Make everyone take same cuts.

Cindy Jones, 46241 Usher Lane, Valley Lee

Maintain Constant Yield rate. Consider economic consequences of raising taxes in economic downturn. When increase in property tax is imposed, causes harm to the most vulnerable. Need a public debate on this. Echo previous speaker - - look outside box for fresh, new ideas.

Kenneth F. Boothe, 46138 Boothe Farm Lane, Great Mills

Maintain Constant Yield rate. Budget is not going to be sustainable.

Pam Vallandingham, 24066 Mervell Dean Rd., Hollywood

Maintain Constant Yield rate. Going to have to sell my home as I can no longer afford to live here due to taxes. Have recently needed to adjust my spending by 50%. My assessment is far greater than what I could sell home for. Not fair to put burden on homeowners.

Deb Rey, Lexington Park

Maintain Constant Yield rate. Lower the tax rate so that more people will come to the county, which will increase tax base.

Wanda Twigg, EASMC

Against maintaining the Constant Yield Tax rate. Allow rate to increase to provide revenue for schools. Not doing so would be devastating to education.

Randy Guy, Clements, Candidate for Commissioner President

Reduce Property Tax Rate to the Constant Yield. Cut spending. 116 homes in St. Mary's County in foreclosure.

Rich Johnson, Valley Lee, Candidate for Commissioner

Reduce Property Tax Rate to the Constant Yield. Budget proposes \$1.5 m to noncounty agencies -- cut this and dept. heads in half and don't go to New York.

Dan Morris, Candidate for Commissioner

Maintain Constant Yield. Commissioner Jarboe had a recommendation that would have enabled this to happen and it did not involve cutting teachers or police officers. Your efforts should go toward recruiting people to come here to fill the homes.

Fully fund education, concerned about special education. The number of kids with special needs is increasing. It's not the time to cut funding.
