Commissioner Morgan moved, seconded by Commissioner Jones, to approve and authorize Commissioner President Russell to execute the Budget Amendment to return matching funds in project US0941 by \$11,150 to the BOCC Emergency Appropriations account. Commissioner Jones moved, seconded by Commissioner Morris, to approve and authorize Commissioner President Russell to execute the budget amendment using \$75,000 from the Commissioner's Emergency Appropriation reserve to the Southern Maryland Navy Alliance for a SWOT analysis pertaining to NAS Patuxent River. Payment of funds is contingent upon an approved MOU, which includes deliverables, by the BOCC. Motion carried 4-0.

The Commissioners attended the opening ceremony for the annual Special Olympics Spring Games.

ST. MARY'S COUNTY METROPOLITAN COMMISSION: PRESENTATION OF FY 2014-19 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN AND FY2014 CIB

Present: Dan Ichniowski, Director, Metropolitan Commission Rebecca Shick, Chief Financial Officer, Metropolitan Commission Mike Sullivan, Chief of Facilities and Operations, Metropolitan Commission

An overview of the FY2014 Capital Improvement Budget and the FY 2014-FY 2019 Capital Improvement Plan was presented to the Commissioners. Mr. Ichniowski and Mr. Sullivan highlighted water and sewer projects to be completed in 2014 and costs associated with these projects. The Commissioners questioned the significant increase in costs being presented today versus last year's projections and asked that future projections be more representative of the actual costs. METCOM will appear before the BOCC on June 11, 2013, for final approval of their FY2014 CIB budget.

COMMISSIONER'S TIME

The Commissioners highlighted events of the past week.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE FY 2014 RECOMMENDED BUDGET AT CHOPTICON HIGH SCHOOL

Commissioner Russell opened the Public Hearing at 6:35 pm.

Commissioner President Russell provided welcoming remarks and commented on the budget process to date. The final adoption of the FY 2014 Budget is scheduled for May 28, 2013.

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Any additional written comments relative to the FY 2014 Budget must be submitted by May 10, 2013.

Recommended FY2014 Budget

Ms. Kramer provided an overview of the Recommended FY2014 Budget focusing on the General Fund and Capital Improvement Projects. When preparing the budget, the focus was on efficient and effective core government services, limited out-year revenue growth, CIP operating impacts, and the use of fund balance to reduce liabilities that in turn reduce future annual costs. Consideration was also given to the potential impact other budgets (state/federal), sequestration, and BRAC will have on the County.

The proposed budget is based on no change in the County's tax rates. Highlights from the \$212.1M recommended General Fund Budget were provided. The County Department's \$48.8 Operating Budget will maintain staffing levels at the 1999 level, incorporate NextGen, provide two merit step increases for employees, and set aside \$350,000 for BRAC/ Sequestration. The Board of Education will receive \$89,910,979 which includes \$80,363,840 (required maintenance of effort); pension shift of \$3,150,691; \$2,000,000 for OPEB; additional OPEB funding of \$955,256; and a 4% increase of \$3,441,192. This funding will fund the BOE negotiated agreements. The County's allocation to the Sheriff increased by five percent for non-grant activities which reflects compensation improvements, five new positions, and 14 new vehicles. The Sheriff still has the opportunity re-address allocation of funds this month. The Library will receive a five percent increase from last year which will allow the Sunday hours at the Lexington Park Branch to be restored. The College of Southern Maryland funding will add services of a Non-Profit Institute and a Veterans Affairs Coordinator for St. Mary's County.

Ms. Kramer addressed the unassigned general fund balance and the multi-year plan to use these funds for non recurring costs. Major projects to be undertaken in the next three years were presented.

Mr. Tony Jones, Public Information Officer for the County facilitated the following public hearings.

Public Comments. (Comments as noted below are intended as highlights of testimony given and are not verbatim.)

PUBLIC HEARING: HOLLYWOOD VOLUNTEER RESCUE SQUAD

The Rescue Squad requested a rate change from \$.011 to \$.014 which will increase revenue by approximately \$45,546. This would affect only properties in the Hollywood district. The annual average impact per property would be \$8.01.

There were no comments.

PUBLIC HEARING: RIDGE VOLUNTEER RESCUE SQUAD

The Rescue Squad requested a rate change from \$.008 to \$.011 which will increase their revenue by approximately \$24,022. This would affect only property in the Ridge district. The annual average impact per property would be \$6.09.

There were no comments.

PUBLIC HEARING: CONSTANT YIELD TAX

The County is considering not reducing the current tax rate of \$.0857 to the constant yield rate of \$0.8526.
