A Granddaughter's Journey

Lighthouse Keeper's Granddaughter returns to Piney Point By April Havens

The Friends support historical interpretation, educational programs and special needs of the sites managed by the Museum Division of St. Mary's County Department of Recreation and Parks: St. Clement's Island Museum, the Little Red Schoolhouse, the Piney Point Lighthouse, Museum and Historic Park, the Drayden African-American Schoolhouse, and the U-1105 Black Panther German submarine shipwreck preserve. A non-profit organization, the Friends sponsor special events, assist with acquisitions and publish this newsletter to broaden understanding of and interest in these important historic sites.

Inside: Volunteer Appreciation, Carol Goes to the Big Easy, Friends News and more! My genealogical mind was bubbling over with anticipation of the arrival of a relative of Lighthouse Keeper Loch Humphreys (also spelled Lock).

In early April, Elizabeth Shire had contacted me stating that she was the granddaughter of light keeper Loch Humphreys, and asked if the museum had any information

or photos of him. He'd been the Piney Point Lighthouse Keeper from 1911 to 1919. I excitedly told her that we had some general information and a photo of him with two children on our exhibit panel. I asked if she had any photos or information she would be willing to share. She said she did and agreed to meet in May.

Lighthouse keeping was often a family endeavor and Elizabeth

had decided it was time to visit the place of her grandfather's and father's past. On May 3, she arrived at Piney Point full of excitement. Our first order of business was to share information. I provided Elizabeth with copies of Federal Census data for 1910, 1920 and 1930. The 1910 census listed Lock W. Humphreys as a Light Keeper for Government Services residing in the 1st District of Calvert County, MD with his family.

When Lock was appointed as the Piney Point Lighthouse Keeper in 1911, he moved his family into the keeper's quarters. The family consisted of wife Ellen, 12-year-old daughter Rosalie, 9-year-old son Marion, and 11-month-old daughter Leone. Elizabeth



then told me that her father, Loch Weems Humphreys Jr. had been born in the keeper's quarters!

The 1920 census listed 45-year-old Lock W. Humphreys as a millwright for a grain elevator company, residing in Baltimore City with his wife Ellen, daughter Leone and son Lock W. Jr. This was certainly news to

Elizabeth and she wondered why they had chosen to move away from the southern counties of Maryland.

By 1930, Lock W. Humphreys was listed as a carpenter for a general contractor. His family still consisted of wife Ellen, daughter Leone and son Lock W. Jr., all residing in Ward 26 of Baltimore City.

Elizabeth shared several photos of her grandfather. Some were of Lock as a young man, some with his sons and one of Elizabeth and her grandfather. She had a photo of Lock and his wife Ellen celebrating what appears to be a 50th wedding anniversary. When Elizabeth asked how I knew it was an anniversary photo, I chuckled. I magnified the photo and showed her the smaller photo and wedding bell atop the cake. The most exciting photo, however, was one of the Humphreys family visiting Piney Point many years later. It shows Elizabeth's parents, her grandfather and grandmother and, she believes, an aunt standing in front of the keeper's quarters (pictured on cover).

I asked Elizabeth if she would like to see her grandfather in his Lighthouse Service uniform. We went into the exhibit gallery and Elizabeth was all smiles as I showed her the photo of Lock Weems Humphreys. I then took Elizabeth to the keeper's quarters and lighthouse tower. She was amazed that her grandfather had lived and worked in such unique surroundings.

Often a family endeavor becomes much more, Elizabeth and I will stay in touch as we learn more about Lock Weems Humphreys, Keeper of the Piney Point Light.

A Letter From Debra

Dear Friends,


This spring we saw the completion of two of our grant projects. One of our large grants from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority was awarded in 2007 to assist with the Piney Point Lighthouse, Museum and Historic Park enhancements. The project supported part of the construction of new parking areas and walkways, and included the Dory Boat exhibit shelter and signage for the site. The final part of the project included 4 new interpretive panels covering the history of the Navy Workshop building; the Museum Building and Stuart Petroleum, the Dory Boat and an environmental panel explaining the rain garden and bio-retention pond. An orientation kiosk and several signs with the site map will assist visitors as they move around the property.

The second grant completed was from the Southern Maryland Heritage Area Consortium for a set of interpretive panels explaining the stories of the original Blackistone Lighthouse and the new replica of the Blackistone Lighthouse. The panels will be installed on the island this summer. It is estimated that approximately 80% of the visitors to the Island arrive on privately owned boats when there are no volunteers or staff on hand to explain the site's history. The panels, to be added to the existing interpretive panels, will help interested visitors understand the Island's remarkable history.

Each of the interpretive panels is designed according to a template we use to make sure there is a branding that clearly and consistently identifies the Museum Division. The story lines have to be researched, proofed for accuracy, written and professionally edited. Graphics have to be identified, copied and changed to a digital format, and copyrights secured. Once everything is written and collected, the material has to be laid out and a design for the sign finalized, drafted and edited. It is a time-consuming project that requires multiple skills. This year we were fortunate to have intern Kate Goggin helping with the St. Clement's Island signs and former Historic Site Coordinator Lydia Wood working on both sets of signs. You can read about Kate's work with us on Page 6.

It is always a good feeling to have projects completed and products of quality that enhance the credibility of the Museum Division. I heartily thank Kate and Lydia as well as all the partners that assisted with the research and the graphics and the financing of the signs.

SCIM Intern Sharpens Skills, Goes for Credential

Kate Goggin had 15 years of experience working in communications for public and private organizations, much of it at the Department of the Interior in public relations and community outreach. She had great assignments everywhere. But she wanted to try something new.

She says she lucked out when she landed an internship at the St. Clement's Island Museum, where she was mentored by Debra Pence as she pursued the Certified Interpretive Planner credential offered by the National Association for Interpretation (NAI). Kate had a tight timeframe for proposing and completing an interpretive media project required for obtaining the credential. Kate had friends in Colton's Point and was familiar with the museum. She contacted Debra, who told her about several projects, including an outstanding mini-grant to create interpretive signage explaining the histories of the original Blackistone Lighthouse on St. Clement's Island and the replica lighthouse built in 2008. "We decided her goals and our project were a good match," Debra said. The panels Kate subsequently

worked on, to be installed on the island this summer, will be an important interpretive asset, "since a majority of the time there isn't anyone on site to explain to visitors the difference in the two structures," Debra added.



Kate's "aha" moment about a career change came at the 2010 National Boy Scout Jamboree, where she was managing her agency's exhibit about river restoration, endangered fish and invasive species. "I loved all aspects of the work – organizing and training volunteers, designing the exhibit, educating the 12,000 Scouts, leaders and members of the public, and being outside. I found myself saying out loud, 'this is what I

want to do – public affairs in the woods," Kate recalled. "Fortunately, a colleague from the National Park Service in the adjacent campsite said, 'Then have you have thought about interpretation?' That was the spark that sent me on a two-year journey towards interpretation" – and into the rigorous NAI program.

Kate says she's grateful for the opportunity she had at the St. Clement's Island Museum. "Debra really helped me see how this work could build upon my previous communications career and take it in a new direction. Her encouragement prompted me to propose a large-scale interpretive project for my agency – I'm working on that now!"
