As a follow up to previous discussions, Mr. Lacer presented an Agreement and Purchase of Sale between Henry T. Waring and Cherry Cove Land Development Company, Inc. and the Board of County Commissioners for St. Mary's County, Maryland. The Agreement sets forth the provisions of the proposed sale from Mr. Waring to the County for 19+ acres located in the Eighth Election District on Great Mills Road in the amount of \$925,000.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' TIME

Maryland Transit Authority Meeting

Commissioner Mattingly referred to the public meeting held Thursday, at the Department of Public Works building on the new routes scheduled for the fall public transportation program. He reported that about 40 people attended. MTA will be expanding the bus service to the Wildewood area, and passengers will be picked up at the airport terminal.

Maryland Association of Counties Summer Conference

Commissioner Mattingly indicated that the MACo Conference held last week was a good opportunity to network with others from other jurisdictions.

African/American One-Room School House

Commissioner Anderson referred to the offer by an individual to donate the school and property to the County. He requested the following information: that Jim Stirling, Director of Capital Projects, provide a packet of information regarding the stabilization and maintenance (potential costs), analysis of the site to determine what amenities could be added; that Michael Humphries to give comments on how the school house could be incorporated into our museum program. Once the information is gathered, staff will be requested to present their findings to the Board.

Commissioner Guazzo suggested that because there are over 500 historical structures in the County, the County should have a policy regarding donated land.

Relationship of Townhomes and Single Family Detached Homes

Commissioner Guazzo referred to statistics regarding the viability of the relationship of townhomes and the number of single family detached homes as to how it affects the economy of the area. Charles County has around 35 townhomes for every 65 detached homes and which has had an impact on economic growth and adequate facilities.

She requested that the Planning Department provide statistics on what has been built and what projects have been approved to date, and that this issue be considered during the development of the Unified Development Code.

Public Schools Convocation

Commissioner Raley indicted that he had attended the Public Schools' convocation for all of its employees prior to the opening of the new school year. He expressed congratulations to the employees and to the Board of Education.

New Hampton Inn Open House

Commissioner Randall stated that she attended the Hampton Inn Open House and reported that she wanted to express how pleased she was that this project was a partnership between Mr. Tom Waring and the Minority Business Alliance.

NAVAIR SYSCOM

Commissioner Randall advised that she met with Vice Admiral Lockhard, and that he had expressed a strong interest in working with the Commissioners to assimilate the NAVAIR SYSCOM into the community. He requested that the Commissioners develop some cooperative events in order to get this group oriented to the County.

Lower Potomac River Strategy Group

Commissioner Anderson stated he had the pleasure of accompanying the referenced group on its annual tour of St. George Creek, and that this group does a good job in watching out for the quality of the river and providing recommendations on what needs to be done.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT GULLY EROSION IN SUBWATERSHEDS IN THE PATUXENT RIVER

As requested by the Board the referenced individuals appeared before the Board to present information relative to severe gully erosion occurring in subwatersheds draining into the Patuxent River due to development. Via a slide presentation Mr. Stewart provided the background and efforts to address the issue of the highly erosive soil conditions at Cuckhold Creek Watershed. He pointed out that the Cuckhold Creek Watershed is representative of most of the small subwatersheds that drain into the Patuxent River. Accelerated stormwater runoff from agricultural fields, roads, and development cause severe ravine-like gullying, and there are also issues of steep, erosive slopes from proposed roadways and subdivisions. Mr. Stewart advised that the gullying and erosion problems are not considered until late in the review process, and that provisions in the Sediment Control Ordinance, Zoning Ordinance, and the Stormwater Management regulations do not address this issue.

During his presentation Mr. Stewart advised that Cuckhold Creek Watershed was selected to be one of the targeted watersheds, and a subcommittee of the Patuxent River Commission was formed to determine ways to control the rate of gully erosion. The subcommittee is addressing identifying funding sources to apply conservation measures to repair the active gullies in the watershed; and identifying ways to prevent future gullying from occurring as a result of intensified development within the watershed.

Commissioner Guazzo indicated that one of the places this issue could be addressed is with the Planning Commission because at this time the Planning Commission, in some instances, has not required developers to work with Mr. Stewart, and the taxpayers end up paying for the corrections.

In conclusion the Commissioners requested that Mr. Smedley and Ms. Veith prepare a letter to the Planning Commission addressing two issues—(1) requesting the Commission to be aware of the concerns that have been expressed by the Soil Conservation District regarding gullying and steep slopes; that there have been two subdivisions in the northern end of the County that received preliminary approval despite serious erosion problems in that area; that the Commission request engineers and developers to cooperate with the County in that there are currently no rules and regulations in place at this time; and that these issues be addressed early in the process and prior to the adoption of the Unified Development Code; (2) that the Commission address these erosion problems in the development of the Unified Code.

In addition Commissioner Guazzo noted that there are state roads in areas of highly erosive soils, e.g., Route 6, which goes through the northern end of the Patuxent River drainage basin. She stated that these roads are built/improved and the County is left to pay for the corrections. The Commissioners requested Mr. Stewart to provide the Board with a list of the roads with problems as well as roads that could lead to problems and to include costs to correct the problems. The Commissioners will be meeting with the Department of Transportation on September 28, at which time this issue can be addressed.

Other areas of discussion included recommended language in the Code to address this issue; that there are members on the Patuxent River Commission from Prince George's County, and they are open to including similar language in their county code; and that Tri-County Council should be requested to give support.

METROPOLITAN COMMISSION ST. MARY'S COUNTY AQUIFERS

As requested by the Commissioners Mr. King and Mr. Russell appeared before the Board to provide an overview of the aquifers in St. Mary's County. Information in the presentation was based on reports by the Maryland Geological Survey and the United State Geological Survey. The report included information on the Southern Maryland Geology (location, depth, composition); location and results of test wells); types of aquifers in St. Mary's County (artesian and surficial); aquifers in St. Mary's County (Piney Point/Nanjemoy (primarily used by domestic wells), Aquia (primarily aquifer for municipal water systems), and Mattaponi (discovered by a test well in 1981)); thickness and transmissivity of the aquifers; effects of aquifer use; aquifer simulation model population projections.

In conclusion Mr. Russell presented a handout showing the decrease in water use since the mandatory water use restriction was put in place.

DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING AND ZONING WATER/SEWER AMENDMENT PROCESS

As requested by the Board, Mr. Grimm appeared before the Board to explain the water and sewer comprehensive plan amendment process. He explained that every three years the county-wide comprehensive water and sewer plan is updated in accordance with state statute; twice a year (March and September) DPZ considers amendments to the plan; and the local plan allows for administrative review for expansion of community sewerage service within growth areas or shared water or sewerage facilities at monthly intervals. Relative to the six-month review, Commissioner Mattingly had suggested that the review take place every 45 days instead of the 60 days. Mr. Grimm responded that this would be addressed during the adequate facilities review. Other areas of discussion included the need to encourage developers to use community well systems rather than individual wells.
