Events Add Up to Sizzlin' Summer Fun Museums Enjoy a Banner Summer Season

Our museums rode a wave of summer activity and enjoyed a banner season with plentiful visitation at both St. Clement's and Piney Point museums. Despite the rising gas prices and this summer's oppressive heat, people were still on the move and looking for fun things to do. The Museum Division offered interesting, educational and entertaining events to attract visitors

and provide them with an enjoyable and memorable experience.

The kick-off of summer events at the St. Clement's Island Museum began in mid-June with a thunderous rumble of bikers participating in the American Motorcycle Festival Poker Run sponsored by Maryland Interna-

tional Raceway (MIR). The museum served as one of seven "rump rests" for over 160 bikers who cruised into Colton's Point to pick up their poker card for a chance of winning a cash prize at the festival. The bikers delighted in the riverside setting and many lingered to enjoy the museum and the scenic view.

Also in June, the St. Clement's Hundred hosted the long-awaited **opening of the Blackistone Lighthouse** on St. Clement's Island, a replica of the original built in 1851. The invitation-only opening ceremony drew hundreds who had anxiously anticipated the completion of a structure that would be a monument to the his-



tory and heritage of St. Clement's Island. State and local officials, Department of Natural Resources staff, former Governor Marvin Mandel, descendents of the original light keepers, project donors and volunteers, and community leaders celebrated the completion of this project, so passionately supported by all in attendance.

The recreated lighthouse will serve as a centerpiece for local maritime history and become a destination for lighthouse lovers for years to come.

The annual **Poto**mac Jazz & Seafood Festival in July was a sellout for the second year in a row as jazz lovers came from as

far as Connecticut, North Carolina and Florida. More than 800 ticket holders, sponsors and guests soaked up the sun and a refreshing riverside breeze while grooving to three dynamic jazz groups who brought many to their feet to dance. Summer Sentinels

There are approximately 2,000 nesting pairs of osprey, sea or fish hawks, found in the Chesapeake Bay region — about 25 percent of all the osprey in the United States. Osprey return to the same nesting site and rebuild or construct their nests on tree snags, manmade nesting platforms and even navigational markers. The young, which look much like the adults, have white on the tips on their feathers, giving them a speckled look. Leaving in mid-September for their migration to the uppermost portion of South America, their absence will soon be noticed. They will return around St. Patrick's Day.

Cycling, Swimming and Self-Discovery



It's become a tradition. For the past six years, the 11th-grade students of The Heights School in Potomac, MD, make a springtime pilgrimage to St. Clement's Island. This is not any ordinary student visit nor are these any ordinary students.

The Heights School is a private, independent, preparatory school for boys in grades 3 to 12. The School's mission is to assist parents in the intellectual, moral, physical, and spiritual education of their sons.

Under the direction of their teacher Chris Breslin, accompanied by their headmaster Alvaro de Vincente, and chaplain Javier Del Castillo, the students arrive on a scheduled day at the end May. They ride bicycles from Cobb Island, MD to the Museum in Colton's Point – about a 38-mile journey! They rest, eat, and as teenage boys always do, find time for some horseplay.

By 2 p.m. the young men are ready for the next leg of their journey – the half-mile swim from the museum to St. Clement's Island. At this point, it's serious business. Mr. Breslin coordinates with the 7th District Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad to oversee the safety of the more than 30 boys in the water. Fire department rescue boats from the 7th District, Hollywood, Leonardtown and Ridge accompanied the boys, some of whom had difficulty in managing the strong current between the shore and the island.

Once on the island, they settled in for their overnight stay and gathered together for a celebratory Catholic mass lead by Father Castillo. The next morning, the students left with a sense of selfconfidence, accomplishment and camaraderie, products of a journey of self-discovery.

A Letter From Debra

Dear Friends,

The Museum Division had a successful grant season with more than \$261,000 awarded from both state and federal funding for 2008-2009 projects. The grants have been matched with St. Mary's County capital funds.

• The Maryland Historic Trust awarded \$25,000 to be used for the \$50,000 project to replace the Piney Point Lighthouse Keeper's Quarter's metal roof and repair the shingled porch roofs. We hope to initiate work this fall.

• The Chesapeake Bay Gateways Network, a program of the National Park Service, awarded the Museum Division a \$43,500 matching grant to replace the creek-side pier at Piney Point. The project includes incorporating a kayak launch to the pier and erecting environmental and boating safety interpretive panels with laminated brochures.

• An award of \$92,500 came from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority and will be used to continue work on Piney Point Lighthouse, Museum and Historic Park parking, walkways and landscape projects.

• Program Open Space awarded \$100,000 to help with the grounds enhancements as well.

We are currently working on getting the permits approved to initiate the \$80,000 MHAA matching grant award (2007) to begin the Piney Point parking and walkway project. We hope the combined awards will produce walkways, parking facilities and baywise gardens that will serve as an example of critical area sensitive construction and landscaping. The 2008 Maryland Heritage Areas Authority award of \$70,000 will help fund the \$140,000 worth of exhibit work to complete the interior of the Potomac River Maritime Exhibit building. This project is up and running with staff currently researching history and securing copyright permissions for graphics.

There are a lot of projects in progress and many changes will materialize over the next 18 months or so. Please keep an eye on the St. Mary's County Museum Division as we bring our exhibits and parks to a new level of presentation and professionalism.

chairs with toes tapping. This event has put the St. Clement's Island Museum on the map.

The following week, the **St. Clement's Island History and Heritage Day** (formerly known as Black-eyed Susan Day) drew more than 220 people to the island for a tour of the Blackistone Lighthouse and live music by local musician Joe Norris, heritage games for kids, an educational exhibit about the pre-colonial Woodland Indians provided by Historic St. Mary's City, an exhibit of the 17th-century Maryland militia by Museum Trustee member Frank Maio, and costumed interpreter Mike Barbour portraying Dr. Thomas Gerard, 17th-century proprietor of St. Clement's Island. Free watermelon slices were a welcome touch of hospitality on a hot summer day.

A favorite summer event took place the first Saturday of August – **Children's Day at the St. Clement's Island Museum.** More than 350 children and parents enjoyed a fun-filled program of hands-on activities, giveaways and community organizations. The highlights of the day were the K-9 demonstration by the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office and the comedic magic of Reggie Rice, also known as Super Magic Man, who captivated and amazed his audience.

At the Piney Point Lighthouse Museum visitation has been great! According to site supervisor April Havens, "We have found more local people are 'staycationing' but are still seeing an increase in out-of-town visitors despite the increase in gas prices. Now that the museum is open 7 days a week, our visitation at Piney Point is up! In the month of July we only had one day without a paying tour and that was due to 98-degree heat!"

As summer ebbs and fall approaches, life around the museums may appear to be slowing down, but the staff plans and prepares for future events, educational programs, guided tours, and new exhibits that keep our museums interesting and educational – always offering something new to see and do!

Friends Fund Summer Intern

conservation boxes with artifacts, managing their inventory status, and photographing those artifacts that needed visual documentation.

The water-resistant conservation boxes will help protect the artifacts from possible water and humidity damage. The boxes will also consolidate artifacts and their listings so that an inventory can be done expediently to prepare for



emergency situations such as hurricanes. Any time artifacts are moved, an inventory to track them must be done. Collections management is of vital importance in maintaining the integrity of all artifacts and adhering to the standards set by the American Association of Museums, which is the key to maintaining our accreditation.
