1. CALL TO ORDER

Richard Johnson, Chair, called the Redistricting Board Public Hearing to order at 6:08 pm at the Lexington Park Library, Lexington Park, MD 20653.

3. PUBLIC HEARING

A. REDISTRICTING BOARD PUBLIC HEARING

Present: Richard Johnson, Chair Matthew Burgan, Vice Chair

Mr. Johnson reviewed the data on the current map and explained that the Board's tasking was to balance population within 10%. He commented that on the current map District 4 has 7,641 more than it should have; District 1 is short 1,813, District 2 is short 3,852 short and District 3 is short 1,977. Data reviewed by the Board included total population, the number of people over 18 and registered voters. The Board looked at natural boundaries like roads and also tried to keep communities together. Mr. Johnson responded to a question asked at the second public hearing which was, if you have an in-balance in District 4 of 7,461 above the average how can 28,266 people be impacted by that small a number. He explained that when he adjusted District 4, which butted to District 1 and 2 they were unbalanced so when you balance them out it affects District 3.

Mr. Burgan welcomed citizens and explained the direction given and the process the Board has gone through thus far. He explained that they were not to take future growth into account and that the three data sets used were total population, registered voters and voters over the age of 18. He noted the delta between the highest district and the lowest district on the current map is 11,676. On the proposed draft map the delta is 389. The object was to get as closed to the amount to balance districts then receive public input. He assured citizens that their input was appreciated and again reiterated that the proposed map is still a draft.

Chairman Johnson asked John Houser, Assistant County Attorney to provide guidelines for the public hearing and open the hearing for public comment.
